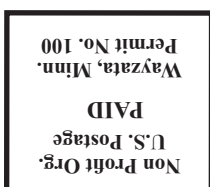
Recently Holy Name Youth Ministry has started something new, something that isn't about the teens, or Holy Name or about us having fun. Holy Name of Jesus Service Teams (HST) are meant to help those less fortunate than us. Each group has done something different. The service projects have teen leaders that plan and work out all the details of the service project with an adult

leader. Two of my friends and I were the teen leaders for our project.

Our project was for the Simpson Men's Homeless Shelter. We needed to make 100-200 sandwiches for the men to eat through the day. Jackie, Alyssa and myself worked together to plan this event recruiting friends to join on this service team project. We had about 15 high school kids show up to start making sandwiches at 9:00 a.m. Jackie and Alyssa bought the turkey, ham and cheese to make the sandwiches and I had bought the bread and the bags. We asked each person to bring \$5 to help pay for the ingredients. After setting up the assembly line we got started. It took us about an hour (and one trip to the grocery store) and we were done making 200 sandwiches.

We took cars to Minneapolis to drop off the sandwiches and learn about the homeless shelter. We saw the

## Dan Garry's AdMINISTRY Bits

January 1 is just another day when you think about it. While many have affixed the opportunity to change their behavior on this day, each day provides the same opportunity in reality. Nevertheless, I would support picking out something in your life you would like to improve and doing something about it. If it's January 1; great. If it's a couple of weeks later, that will work, too.

I wonder what would be the most common thing people want to change about themselves. I would have to guess their weight or physical condition followed closely by some habitual unhealthy behavior (drinking, smoking, shopping, losing their temper, etc). ## Cookies for a Cause

**Do.** That is the one word summary our Confirmation group leader, Tim Radermacher, gave us in regards to the Church's view on Christian charity—go out into the world and *act* as the hands of Jesus to those of His children who need Him the most. Our group decided to volunteer at the Cookie Cart, a cookie-making facility that employs teens, their ages ranging from 14 to 17, to give them job experiences and teach them skills they'll need to know in the business world. You may be familiar with the cookies these teenagers make—we eat them every Sunday after Mass with “coffee and donuts.”

Our group was fortunate enough to go to the Cookie Cart one Saturday and make cookies, as well as a few weeks later, to sell cookies after the Sunday morning Masses. In both cases, we worked alongside the Cookie Cart staff. It was great to get to know them—we talked about everything from our school experiences to what kind of music we liked. I was struck by how smart, funny, dedicated, caring, and talented these other teens were; I came away from the experience feeling like I had gained more from them than I had given by volunteering. That is the beauty of community service: God lives in everyone, and each of God's children has something to give. To find out what that special something is, you only need to venture out into your community.

“By volunteering at Cookie Cart, I learned that it's really worth it to get up early on a Saturday morning and go make a difference in the lives of other teens in our community,” comments Carol Coutinho, one of our Confirmation students. Our experience, as is the case with any community service experience, was highly rewarding because we made connections within our community and strove to help others as God taught us. So we challenge you: go out into the world and work towards improving a cause you feel passionate about... you may be surprised how much you get back!

peace with themselves (overlook or even appreciate some of their blemishes) and be better equipped to make changes if they want to.

## Why We Need to Save General Assistance Medical Care (GAMC)

I cannot imagine what it would be like to have no medical coverage. Even with good medical insurance and generally good health, the co-pays and drug costs really mount up. If I had to pay out-of-pocket for even routine medical care, it would be a strain on the budget; a serious illness or surgery would be a financial disaster. In our state there is a group of persons who will have to face that reality this coming March. These are the folks, single adults of very low income with no dependent children, between the ages of 18 and 65, who currently receive their medical care through the General Assistance Medical Care (GAMC) program that our governor eliminated from the state budget this past year, leaving 35,000 people, the poorest of the poor, with no medical coverage.

Who are these people? They are young adults like Robert, 23, who didn't think he needed insurance until he got a brain tumor. The medical costs so far are more than \$150,000 and side effects of the treatment have left him unable to work. They are older adults like Frank, 63, who has chronic lung disease that makes it impossible for him to work. He is two years away from Medicare, has \$60,000 in outstanding medical bills and not enough social security income to purchase his own insurance. They are partially disabled people like Sarah, age 45, who suffers from chronic pain after a car accident years ago. She can work part time, but cannot afford private health insurance and has \$40,000 in medical bills from a recent surgery. GAMC is the only health coverage available. Many of the people who depend on GAMC have mental illness, chronic and disabling health problems and/or chemical dependency. Many are homeless or live in subsidized housing. To qualify for GAMC, their yearly income must be less than \$7800. I cannot imagine trying to live on less than \$8000 a year!

Some have suggested that these people should be enrolled in the MinnesotaCare program, which provides a low-cost insurance for the working poor. But most current GAMC recipients cannot afford even the subsidized premiums for MinnesotaCare, nor can they survive the four-month waiting period before becoming eligible for Minnesota care benefits. That's a long time to wait if you have diabetes and need insulin or you have schizophrenia and need your antipsychotic meds! Without GAMC, the health of these vulnerable adults will deteriorate rapidly; deaths will occur and mentally ill men and women will lose all chance of housing and job stability.

The long term costs for the loss of GAMC will eventually roll down to all the rest of us, of course. Emergency care for very ill people always costs more than preventive care, and those costs will inevitably be added on to the insurance premiums of each of us who are so lucky as to have insurance. According to a study last spring by Families USA, in 2008 the average family paid an extra \$1000 a year in extra health insurance premiums to make up for the costs of health care for the growing number of uninsured Americans. That will only go up when GAMC is history. An outcome I would never have thought of is that public hospitals like Hennepin County and Regions will lose thousands of dollars in income from GAMC-insured patients, causing layoffs among their staff and elimination of vital programs that benefit everyone. I have worked at Hennepin County; it's a wonderful facility and anyone would be happy to be cared for there. I have also visited public hospitals in other states where there is no coverage for the poor and you wouldn't want to step foot in these institutions, believe me.

It is a disgrace for our state to consider treating people in this way.

Jesus had a soft spot for the poor and He must be crying to think about this shameful attempt to balance our state budget on the back of our poorest citizens. If we believe that we are all brothers and sisters in Christ, bestowed with equal human dignity by our creator, we cannot stand by and let this happen. What can we do? A coalition of concerned citizens is making a suggestion to legislators that they come up with a re-working of the GAMC plan with a smaller, more efficient budget. If the legislature overrides the governor's veto of their proposed budget, and presents a feasible plan, there is hope. Before the legislators get back to work on February 4, let's flood their offices with our concern. You could even say that you'd pay a bit more in taxes to ensure that the poor of our state get adequate medical care!

## New Beginnings in the Faith Formation Department

Warm summer days turned into beautiful fall colors and now into chilly wintry days and it's already six months since I became the Director of Faith Formation here at Holy Name of Jesus. I am very grateful to all of you for making my transition such a wonderful experience, and I want all of you to know how much I love serving you here at HNOJ. This is such a welcoming community and I feel very blessed to be a part of it. I'm also excited that I don't get lost as often these days! Deacon Sam Catapano continues to be a wonderful resource and help to myself and the entire staff. We really appreciate all his support and assistance.

We just celebrated the birth of Jesus – what a wonderful new beginning to our Church year! These past six months of new beginnings in the Faith Formation department have been an exciting and busy time for not only me but for the entire Faith Formation staff. One very significant goal of the staff as we began our new year was to evaluate our curriculum in both the elementary and the first year Confirmation program. After much consideration, it was decided that we would implement the same curriculum that HNOJ School was using, *Call to Faith* by Harcourt Publishing, in our elementary program, so that we would be more unified in what each grade level was learning throughout the parish.

We also made the decision to add a new component to our first year Confirmation program so that we could give our youth more options and better meet their needs. This year, in addition to the *Passion Play* as a second semester class option, we are also offering the *Bible Timeline for Teens*. Chris Kostelc, our Youth Minister, and Deacon Sam Catapano will be leading the students through the Old Testament. Under the direction of Lee Ann Herbert, students will participate in the *Passion Play: "What I Have Seen I Will Tell"* during the second semester.

We have been striving to involve more volunteers at different levels of faith formation. However, we know how busy our families are today and that it is often difficult for parents to keep updated on current happenings and policies. To better serve both our parents and catechists, this past summer we developed both parent and catechist handbooks that we hope will make it easier for parents and our volunteers to find information they need readily and easily.

Another significant new beginning here at Holy Name of Jesus is that we are now preparing the children in both second and fourth grade for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The Archdiocese has requested that children be prepared for the Sacrament of Reconciliation prior to re-

ceiving their First Eucharist. In order to "catch up," we will offer Reconciliation catechesis for our second and fourth grade students both this year and next year with the intent that in the future we will be preparing the second grade students. In addition to the classroom and home study, the children participated in a newly designed Reconciliation Retreat this past November. With the parents as the primary educators, they led their children through a series of six different centers. It was powerful to witness the face to face time that the children and their parents shared and was a truly wonderful day for all.

Our Life Teen program has been excited to welcome a newly recruited, trained, and enthusiastic Life Teen Core Team. This year's Core Team consists of five new members, who have added a tremendous amount of enthusiasm to our weekly sessions. We are very blessed to have such talented individuals step forward and share their faith with our teens.

While we have had many new changes, our adult ministry continues to offer strong adult programming for men and women through small Christian communities, Bible studies, and ministries to special needs parishioners. We have begun plans for the Lenten program, *Christians in Search*, and are looking forward to working with our small Christian communities again this year.

With all these new endeavors, it is important to evaluate the programs we offer and be sure that we are meeting the needs of all our parishioners. One way that we are striving to accomplish this goal has been to begin a strong evaluation process for all our catechetical programs. Recently our staff met with a professional to help us write effective and meaningful evaluations so that we can continuously improve our programming.

Thank you for your support of Holy Name of Jesus Faith Formation. Only by working together can we provide the extensive catechetical and sacramental programs available at HNOJ. May God continue to bless the parishioners of HNOJ as we all strive to carry out the mission and become closer to Christ.

## Marriage: It Matters!

I try to keep up with research on marriage. In some recent research, we find that marriage matters in lots of ways. Here are some research findings: Some couples say that their spouse drives them crazy. Think again: A study published in the British Medical Journal finds that people who lived with a partner during middle age had much lower odds of developing dementia or Alzheimer's disease. People who were single or divorced were 1.5 times more likely to develop dementia and 1.8 times more likely to develop Alzheimer's, while those widowed are 3.3 times more likely. These findings are in line with previous studies that have found that mental stimulation in the form of education, work or intellectual leisure activities has a protective effect against cognitive decline. I guess it means either use it or lose it. The new study makes a convincing case that the intellectual stimulation provided by a spouse is a key factor in long term mental health. (Looks like I'm in luck. I've been trying to figure out my wife for years). Here is a snapshot of marriage in the U.S.

### Marriage

People are getting married later in life. The median age for males is 27; for females it is 25. There has been a modest decline in the divorce rate since it reached an all-time high in 1980.

- In a given year nearly half of all marriages are remarriages for one or both partners.
- The marriage rate (annual number of marriages per 1,000 unmarried adult women) continues to decline. It has dropped 50% in 50 years.
- The marriage rate for African-Americans is considerably lower than for any other U.S. population group.
- The percentage of never married persons aged 25 to 35 has increased by 20% in the past 30 years, suggesting more lifelong singlehood.
- From 40% to 50% of Catholic marriages are between a Catholic and a non-Catholic; regional averages may be higher or lower.
- More than 80% of couples seeking to be married in the Catholic Church participate in a marriage preparation program.
- Within the first few years of marriage nearly half of all inter-church couples become same-church because one spouse or both change religious affiliation.
- Roughly two-thirds of both married men and married women rate their marriages as "very happy." This has remained mostly steady for the past 30 years.

### Divorce

- There has been a modest decline in the divorce rate since it reached an all-time high in 1980; there are

now 18 divorces (rather than 22) per 1,000 married women.

- The projected rate of divorcing still stands at around 50% - this represents the percentage of marriages (first and remarriage) entered into during a particular year that are projected to end in divorce or separation before one spouse dies.
- Approximately 60 to 67% of second marriages end in divorce, and about 74% of third marriages end in divorce.
- About one-third of adults who have ever been married and are still living have experienced a divorce. This percentage rises to 46% for the baby boom generation.
- Catholics are substantially less likely than Protestants to get divorced (25% versus 39%).
- One's chances of divorce are diminished by such factors as: older age, higher income, more education, having a religious affiliation, absence of divorce in family of origin, and having a child after marriage.
- The highest percentage of divorces occurs within the first three years of marriage.

### Cohabitation

- Cohabitation (sexual partners sharing a household) has increased 1100% in 40 years. Over 50% of first marriages are preceded by cohabitation.
- Almost 40% of cohabiting households have children in them.

**Furthermore, Couples Need Each Other's Support!**

After two people marry, they are likely to seek a type of support from each other that they did not seek to the same degree before marrying, according to Daniel Molden, Assistant Professor of Psychology at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois.

Molden is finding through his research that married couples place a high premium on their partners' support of whatever they determine to be necessary obligations. Married people need their spouse's support for fulfilling their responsibilities and meeting their commitments. Before people marry, they tend to focus much more on supporting each other in goals that are future oriented than on goals related to the security and maintenance of their life together, Molden's research suggests. But engaged couples may not suspect how strongly they will need each other's support after they marry not only for reaching goals, but for maintaining the security of their life together.

Molden was the lead researcher in a study to be published in the July issue of Psychological Science. Northwestern University released the study's major findings April 22, 2009. The research suggests that when marriages end in divorce, a key reason could be that the kind of support the spouses need from each other is not present in their marriage.

daughter at 4:00 a.m. as she simply could not get warm and fought through her emotions.

As I tried to comfort her, I too, was full of emotion. Prayer kept me focused as I kept coming back to two key elements: the first was the harsh reminder that we were spending a single night in someone else's daily reality. To think of being without shelter was incomprehensible until that evening. Although I've prayed for the homeless before, it took on a whole new meaning that night. The other element of my prayer was of deep gratitude. How do I humble myself before the Lord and let Him know how truly thankful I am? I learned that saying thank you to our Creator for all He has provided – especially our food and shelter on a daily basis – must be more purposeful. In the First Book of Thessalonians, it says in Chapter Five "to give thanks in all circumstances." The important word in that instruction is "ALL". My prayer going forward is that together we can stop focusing on what we don't have, but rather truly and physically be on our knees praising our Jesus for all that we do have.

Thanks to all of the volunteers that helped plan and organize that memorable evening on December 4, 2009.
