


The Invisible Needs of Our Neighbors By Michelle Hudlow

As I did every day that term, I arrived to work early to prepare to teach my 8 a.m. class. On this day I observed a young lady washing her hair in the restroom. A few days later I saw her get out of a car, the lone occupant. The car was filled to the brim with what I could only presume was her belongings. Again, she washed her hair in the sink and cleaned up for the day before her college classes began.

Yes, she lived in her car. Yes, the school was aware and was trying to help. Yet, she is not the typical image in most people's minds when we think of homelessness.

As a young family, my husband and I lived with his parents more than once, while we struggled to make ends meet. By definition we were not homeless. But what if we did not have parents who cared enough to make room for us? We could have been homeless.



A young man has lived with us for six and half years; a story out of the newspapers, born to an alcoholic mother, taken from her along with his siblings, he spent many years going from foster care to foster care, before being adopted and yet found himself without a home or family to call his own at the age of 20. He is one of six people we have invited into our home over the past 25 years. All of whom may have been homeless without someone to help.

My husband ran a small side business of repairing cars. One of his customers held a really good job, had a nice big house, expensive cars, two kids and wife. At the top of his game. The company reorganized, and customer's family lost it all, they

could barely afford the two-bedroom apartment and a used car that needed work. Homelessness - it can happen at the blink of an eye.

When we think of homelessness, we think of tent cities along Cedar Avenue and the person on the street corner with a sign. But people who are homeless, hungry, in need of help may look like you and I.

When we think of homelessness, we think of downtown Minneapolis, or in my case every intersection along Brooklyn Boulevard in near my Brooklyn Center home. However, on Halloween, I saw two people with signs at an intersection of County Road 9 near Plymouth Target. No city is exempt.

In fact, 60% of the Twin Cities poor population now live in the suburbs; 14% of our own Holy Name of Jesus' neighbors are living in poverty.

People in need may be your child's friend, your neighbor, the person in the pew, or even your friend. Most likely there are no obvious signs - they mean to be invisible.

I write these observations because the people who are living them probably will not share their stories with you. Their struggles are too raw, too real, maybe even embarrassing.



But there is help. In our community, **Interfaith Outreach** helps families with emergency services, such as food, housing, education and employment. In fact, they assist more than 2000 families (over 6000 individuals) each year in the area from Orono to Medicine Lake, from Minnetonka Beach to Plymouth.

Last year, Interfaith Outreach provided 432 people with emergency housing assistance. And they are able to provide shelter at a cost of \$764 per month for a family of four. In contrast the county shelter stay for the same family costs \$3700 per month.

They have provided over 200 preschool aged kids with scholarships for quality childcare and preschool. (recent news reports cited that child care costs an average of \$350 a week!) Over 300 job seekers are currently active in Interfaith Outreach's employment services program. 4485 people, of which 41% were children, used the Interfaith food shelf last year. 375 families received Resale gift cards to purchase clothing and other items, at a total value of \$31,800.

Over the years Holy Name of Jesus has supported Interfaith Outreach and their Sleep Out campaign in many ways. At one time we actually slept out in tents. The past few years we have held a Fire For Discipleship.



This year we are launching something you can schedule on your time, with your family and friends, with a theme of "When we come together... we can love our neighbors".

However we plan to support Interfaith Outreach, the goal is always the same: To raise awareness of the needs in our neighborhood and how we, as a Holy Name of Jesus Family, can make a difference in their lives.



This year, the HNOJ Outreach Ministry challenges you to consider how YOU can help. Interfaith Outreach can only do their work with the help of others. Last year 404 volunteers contributed 19,029 hours to Resale alone. 955 volunteers helped at the food shelf. Many people volunteer to help 214 kids with homework. About 125 volunteers in Interfaith Outreach's database cite an affiliation with Holy Name of

Jesus. 20 parishioners are dedicated, regular volunteers. Can you help?

Interfaith Outreach needs donations of food, clothing, and money to help our neighbors. Maybe this Advent season, you could clean a closet and donate



the things you do not need to Resale. And/or pick out a few items at the grocery store to bring to Mass. And/or participate in the second collection for Interfaith Outreach Dec. 2.

When we come together...we can love our neighbors. What action can you take to share God's love with our neighbors this Advent and every day?

HNOJ Members Embark for Italy Dec. 29

At the end of December, 52 travelers from Holy Name of Jesus will embark on a seven-day pilgrimage to Italy. A pilgrimage is a journey to a sacred destination. This journey will allow our travelers to encounter God in a new and profound way. During our travels we will pause each day for Mass in different churches. Our choir members will experience glorifying God by singing in some very beautiful spaces both visually and acoustically.

Our pilgrimage will begin in Assisi, the birthplace of St. Francis and St. Clare, founders of the Franciscan and Poor Clare's religious orders. We will celebrate Mass in the Basilica of St. Francis on New Year's Day. A day excursion to Florence, in the heart of Tuscany, will include Michelangelo's masterpiece, David, the famous Duomo, and the church of Santa Croce where we will celebrate Mass. The conclusion of our week in Rome will include touring Ancient Roman sights of the Roman Forum and Colosseum. The Vatican Museums and St. Peter's Basilica will definitely be a highlight in the eternal city. Visits to the Christian Rome sights will include the St. John Lateran Basilica, and St. Mary Major.

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Eucharistic Adoration is an opportunity: an opportunity to find an oasis of peace in the midst of a hectic world, an opportunity for silence in the midst of ceaseless noise, an opportunity for reflection in the midst of never-ending tasks of daily life. Most of all, it is an opportunity to spend time with Jesus, and to get to know him as a friend; a friend who delights simply in time spend with those he loves.

God wants to be close to us. The Eucharist is the miracle of this closeness in our lives. The goal of adoration is to help us appreciate this miracle in a deeper way, so that we enter more deeply into the wonder of the Mass and allow it to transform our lives.

How to Begin:

Full Hour: In order to maintain the use of our chapel, it is important that we have people assigned for each hour. Please consider this generous gift of your time. Jesus leaves no gift unrewarded in our lives. If an hour each week is not possible for you at this time, you can also team up with others so as to share the time, either by alternating weeks or by splitting the hour.

Trial Period: Not sure if adoration is for you? Give it a try by signing up for a six week trial period. If you decide after that period that you'd rather not continue, just let us know. No Guilt. No charge!

Sub-List: If you're not ready to commit to a regular hour but would like to make adoration a part of your life and are willing

to help you, you can add your name to a list of subs to be contacted in case someone can't make their hour.

Learn More: If you are curious, but it's all too much for you right now, you can simply sign up to receive future informational materials about Eucharistic Adoration and the opportunities for it at Holy Name of Jesus. Look for information in the gathering space or at hnoj.org/adoration.

What to do in Eucharistic Adoration

Adore: simply look at Jesus and recognize Him as God. Thank him for His love. Offer Him your heart along with all of its burdens.*

<u>Look:</u> at Him who looks at you with love. Pray: the Rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet or other devotions, intercede for others. <u>Read:</u> the Bible or other spiritual writings.

Listen: for God's voice speaking to your heart. Rest: in God's presence, and allow him to fill your soul with His peace. Be: with Him, center your heart on Him, enjoy His presence.

*Upon entering and before leaving the Chapel, it is customary to genuflect on one or both knees, in reverence to Jesus.

Lighting the First Candle of Hope



The Advent wreath is a common tradition in many households. The wreath is simply a circle of greens holding four candles. The four candles may be white, or the customary three purple and one pink. The purple candles symbolize penance and the preparatory sacrifices made

at this time. The pink candle is lit on the third Sunday of Advent and is a day of rejoicing because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent and anticipate Christmas. The Advent wreath may be a table centerpiece or part of the household's prayer corner.

Today (Dec. 2) is the first Sunday in Advent. Today we light the first candle in our Advent Wreaths, called the Prophecy Candle or Candle of Hope. We can have hope because God is faithful and will keep the promises made to us. Our hope comes from God. (Romans 15:12-13) Before we light the candle, however, we can bless the wreath. Here is a blessing found at United States Conference of Catholic Bishops website (usccb.org).

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says:

Our help is in the name of the Lord.

Response (R/.) Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture, Isaiah 9: (lines 1-2 and 5-6) or Isaiah 63 (lines 16-17 & 19) or Isaiah 64 (lines 2-7) is read:

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

R/. Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says:

Lord our God, we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

R/. Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel": O come, desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of humankind; bid ev'ry sad division cease and be thyself our Prince of peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel. –From *Catholic Household Blessings & Prayers*

As of Oct. 1, HNOJ started using a new version of our membership software. As with our old version, all contributions are attached to the primary person in the household. When creating the thank you letters I found that I could get either the pledge amounts and frequency *or* both spouses names. I connected with the software vendor and there was no automatic way to combine this information. In addition to thanking you for returning your card, our goal with this letter is to make sure your pledge was entered correctly, I could not achieve that with both names on the letter. Therefore, I opted to print just the primary name with the pledge amounts.

HNOJ knows that contributions are a family commitment. If there is any way I could have created the letters with both spouses' names and the pledge amounts accurately and timely, I would have. I just felt that it was more important for each household to have the opportunity to correct any pledge oversights. I am working on a solution for next year.


