Happy New (Old) Year!

Buried deep under the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi are the bones of the great Saint. Twenty years ago I visited his crypt dug out of an Italian hilltop below the floor of the lower Church. I remember feeling a bit claustrophobic and a lot amazed at being so close to the tomb of such a holy and influential man.

In October, I again walked down the stairs into St. Francis's crypt, but this time we not only were to pray with the relics of St. Francis, now we were going to celebrate Mass with him. We knelt to pray as the guards emptied the small area and we began to reflect on the privilege of saying Mass at the tomb of St. Francis.

I was struck by the fact that we were praying the ancient words of the Mass at the tomb of this 900 year old Saint in a country where Catholicism has been practiced for nearly 2000 years. A couple days later when we had Mass at the tomb of St. Peter below the floor of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome the ancientness of our faith became even clearer.

It's no secret or surprise that we live in a time dominated by the tyranny of the new. While we may appreciate the vintage and classic, we are living in a time that professes new is good and old is bad. We are sold items because they are new and we are told that new is better.

How can a faith like ours - Roman Catholicism - so very old compete with the shiny newness being sold to us today? Because what was new is now truly and actually old already. Even the new Christmas sweater just received a mere week ago is starting to lose the novelty of newness. When something is sold on its newness, it usually means it is temporary.

St. John Henry Newman said, "The world grows old, but the Church is ever young." What I think he means is that while we practice a faith ancient and full of tradition, we actually practice a faith that is alive and made ever new by the Holy Spirit. God breaths new life into the Church, and into each us, every moment of every day. We are the religion that says even death isn't the end and professes belief in new life after death.

In the book of Revelation, seated on the throne of heaven, God himself says, "Behold, I make all things new." In that same chapter we read about a new heaven and new earth. God promises that there will be no death, no morning, no pain, He will establish a new order.

Our faith is ancient and new. We have 2000 years of beautiful practice and all is new again. Jesus was born to Mary 2000 years ago, and he came again just last week.

This new year, try something old. Let us not seek to invent some new thing but instead lean into some ancient practice of our faith. Let us go to Mass, go to Confession, pray a Rosary, pray to the saints, bless our children, thank God everyday, ask for forgiveness and help those in need. These are the practices that God has used to make saints out of sinners for 2000 years. Let us try something old to become something new.

Baking for Babies, Pro-Life Cinnamon Roll Sale, Jan. 21-22

Two of the sweetest things in the world are babies and deliciously glazed cinnamon rolls. A Community Caring for Life (ACCL) is hosting Baking for Babies Pro-Life Cinnamon Roll Bake and Sale event Jan. 21-22. This will be the thirty-first year the ACCL has put on this event. The tradition started in January because it's the same month and anniversary of the Roe vs. Wade decision, when the Supreme Court legalized abortion on demand in all 50 states in 1973.

We celebrate the June 24, 2022 Supreme Court ruling in Dobbs vs. Jackson Women's Center which overturned Roe vs. Wade, placing the writing and enforcement of abortion legislation on individual states. ACCL members expect there will be a greater need to support pro-life organizations in Minnesota now because of our pro-choice leadership and their lack of



interest in supporting life-centered organizations.

The MN Catholic Bishops released the following statement Oct. 2, 2022 regarding the current laws in Minnesota. "Right now in Minnesota, the situation is troubling: in spite of the fact

that scientific inquiry has definitively determined that human life begins at conception[2], a woman can procure an abortion for almost any reason at any stage of pregnancy up till birth. Our laws allow an 11-year-old girl to get an abortion without even one parent knowing. There is no requirement in force that a licensed physician perform an abortion. And abortion proponents, including elected officials, are working proactively to shut down pregnancy resource centers."



At Holy Name of Jesus, A Community Caring for Life will give the money raised from our Baking for Babies event to organizations like Pro-Life Action Ministries (PLAM). PALM trains sidewalk counselors to educate mothers on abortion and their preborn child. Southwest Options for Women (SWOW) in Eden Prairie, Robbinsdale Women's Center (RWC) and Abria in Minneapolis and St. Paul all offer free pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, education, counseling and supplies for mother and child.

As long as abortion is legal in Minnesota, our work continues at Holy Name of Jesus. Baking for Babies Pro-Life Cinnamon Roll Event needs volunteers for frosting and assembling Friday and Saturday; selling rolls Saturday and Sunday. The Rosary

Question:

As we honor Mary this month, celebrating the Feast of the Holy Mother of God on Jan. 1, let's dive deeper into the prayer of the Rosary. What is the history of the Rosary? Where did this prayer come from?

Answer:

Although a longstanding tradition attributed the Rosary to Saint Dominic and the Dominican Order, the practice of using beads to count prayers predates the Dominicans by a few hundred years. In fact, it seems that what we now think of as the Rosary (which means "garland of roses") was first developed by illiterate peasants and religious brothers and sisters as a way of offering 150 "Our Fathers" to replace the praying of the 150 psalms in the Divine Office.

The practice of reciting 150 Hail Marys (which was later subdivided into 15 decades of 10 Hail Marys) arose during the late Middle Ages. Devotion to the Rosary began to flourish in the nineteenth century, especially as new devotions to Mary began to spread throughout Europe and the New World. An annual liturgical celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary was introduced into the Church calendar in 1573 and it has been observed on the date of Oct. 7 since 1913.

In the apostolic letter *On the Most Holy Rosary*, Pope Saint John Paul II not only added five new mysteries to the traditional fifteen, but he also reminded Catholics that the Rosary is, at its core, an opportunity to go deeper into the life of Jesus: "The Rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer ... It has all the depth of the Gospel message in its entirety, of which it can be said to be a compendium. It is an echo of Mary's prayer, her perennial Magnificat ... With the Rosary, the Christian people sit at the school of Mary and are led to contemplate the beauty of the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love" (no. 1).
