Update on the Synod

Summer in the Midwest means time at the lake, parades, local festivals (corn, artichoke, raspberry, etc.), and, one of my personal favorites, road trips. I grew up road tripping to relative's homes and various historical landmarks. Not too many years ago my family made the classic Minnesota pilgrimage to the Black Hills of South Dakota.



My folks flew up from St. Louis and my wife, children and parents all piled in the family mini-van, with luggage topper, to make the 9+ hour drive to Hill City, SD where we had rented a house for the long weekend. I have never felt more like Clark Griswold in my life.

We stopped in Mitchell, SD to gaze at the Corn Palace (what's the big deal?). We took a long break at Wall Drug for the nickel coffee and the kitschy knickknacks. We hiked around the badlands and I imagined Teddy Roosevelt roaming this same, strange terrain.

We visited Mount Rushmore, took a train ride to nowhere, hiked a lot and enjoyed the crisp mountain air. All worth the road trip.

The thing about road trips is that they are a lot like life. Like life, they have a start and an ending. While you can just head out on the open road without a plan, a direction or a map - a destination is helpful. Life, like a road trip, is better done with others than alone.

You've heard it said that if you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go with others. Traveling this great journey, this great road trip of life is one that is best spent with others.

Holy Name of Jesus, along with the entire Archdiocese, recognizes these basic truths. As a Church, we are in the process of implementing the vision for Catholics in the Twin Cities as described in the Post Synodal letter *You Will Be My Witnesses* (you can find it here if you haven't read it - www.archspm.org/synodletter/).

In the first year of this process, HNOJ will be engaged in launching a robust, parish wide, small group ministry. The beautiful vision cast by Archbishop Hebda is that every Catholic in the Cities belong to a small group. The idea is that it will be a typical part of an adult Catholic's faith life to join with others in growing in faith.

This fall HNOJ is joining parishes all over our Archdiocese in offering a seven-week course on small groups. Whether you are in a small group now or not, this small group experience will give us all a common language and vision for what small groups in our church could be.

Who is this training for, you ask? If you have ever wanted to grow in your faith, understand something you didn't get about Catholics, improve your prayer life or get closer to other people at HNOJ, then this small group training in the fall is for you. If you have a tight group of friends and wish faith was a greater component of your friendship, then taking this course will help you figure out how to do that with grace and joy. If you feel like an outsider in your own parish and you want to know how to get on the inside, then taking this course will help you find your group and make HNOJ the parish you want it to be.

Following this course, HNOJ will be starting many new small groups in the winter/ spring of 2024. We will have groups for all kinds of people - parents, singles, older folks, young adults, HNOJ School parents, Faith Formation parents, readers, video watchers, outdoorsy types, indoor types, introverts and extroverts - the idea is that everyone will have a group to call their own. To do something like this, we need you (if you are reading this, I really mean you), to say yes and register for the small group course this fall. You might be the only one who can lead the kind of small group that you want at HNOJ. If it isn't you, then who?

A Gift To Receive

Adapted from a homily given by Fr. Wratkowski at Holy Name of Jesus, July 2, 2023.

"You are our brother, we will receive you." These are the words I heard recited by all the upperclassmen, as they received me and my classmates, we who had just committed to live the rule of life of the seminary as we discerned the Lord's call.

It was a moving thing: we had completed a couple months of initiation, learning the names of 171 seminarians, got used to college level courses, and assimilated to the seminary schedule, which included a hour prayer every day at 6:15 a.m. Knowing what we were getting ourselves into, we individually approached the altar, knelt, recited a scripture verse and made our pledge. The community responded, "You are our brother, we will receive you."

In Mt 10, Jesus tells his Apostles as he sends them, "Whoever receives you receives me." He continues by saying there is a special reward for the ones who receive those whom He sends, whether the one sent is a prophet, a righteous man, or even a little disciple in need of a cup of cold water. In these summer months, we can certainly appreciate that the last one is no small thing!

It is good to receive others and to do good for them, for each person has dignity, but that is not Jesus's focus here. Jesus is not saying that the reward is for doing good for someone. Rather, "Whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because the little one is a disciple– amen, I say to you, he will surely not lose his reward." Because the little one is a disciple, that's the reason why. There's a special reward for receiving the ones the Lord sends. That's what the seminary community was trying to embody: To receive the young man who had heard God's call and been sent by God to the seminary to discern.

We see this special reward for receiving the one sent by God in 2 Kgs 4. The prophet Elisha comes to Shunem, a city in the Jezreel valley just south of Nazareth. There is a woman who recognizes Elisha as "a holy man of God," and so she urges him to dine with her household. She also prepares a room for him to stay on his future journeys. Elisha, moved by her generosity, asks, "Can something be done for her?" And yes, she has no son. Elisha then promises her, "This time next year, you will have a son." God employs people as instruments to bring forth his grace and to bestow his gifts. Because she receives the one sent by God, she is rewarded. If she had not received the prophet, then Elisha would not have been there to bring forth God's blessing.

How is this Word alive today? The first is that Jesus invites us, as members of a parish family, to receive each other. There are ways that God wishes to bless us through each other. As a priest, I'm always delighted to hear how someone heard God's message through the word of another or how someone felt the compassion of God through the care of another. This is the way God intends it!

Second, a parish lives this message of Jesus when they receive their priest(s). The bishop, one of the successors of the Apostles, entrusts to a priest the pastoring of a particular parish flock. When a parish receives the priest(s), they receive Jesus, the One Shepherd, and the blessing that comes from receiving the one sent.

I am so grateful for the ways I have been received by this parish community in the last two years. I believe the hospitality I've experienced is one of the things that makes Holy Name of Jesus a special place. My prayer is that this would be Fr. Mike's experience too as he joins our community. We both hope that you experience the Lord's blessing through us, through our efforts to administer the sacraments, to share life with you, and to share our gifts with you.

Our goal is, by God's grace, to get each other to heaven. That too is the goal of marriage, which is a helpful example because in our life together there will be good times and bad times. Spouses help each other get to heaven by their gifts and strengths, such as when they pray for each other or encourage each other to do what is good. Sometimes, spouses help each other get to heaven through their weakness, such as when the other must exercise patience, mercy, and forgiveness. The same is true in a relationship between a pastor and the parish. I hope to be a "positive" blessing for you, but knowing I'm a disciple on the way, there will be times I mess up and need to ask for forgiveness. Throughout, the goal will be to trust God who has brought us together in this time and place and to remain open to the grace provided by God.

Where do we find the strength, the power, to receive one another? We find it in the Eucharist, where we receive Jesus and He receives us. In the Eucharist, we become more closely conformed to Jesus and his Body. When we receive Communion, we can imagine Jesus saying to us, "You are my bother or sister in Baptism. I have received you and I receive you into my Body again through this Eucharist." May our Eucharistic worship strengthen us to receive each other, that the Lord may share with us His reward.

Welcome Fr. Mike!

Fr. Mike comes to us from All Saints Catholic Church in Lakeville, MN. Originally from Rockford, IL, Fr. Mike moved to the Twin Cities in 2000 for school and has lived in the area ever since. He was ordained in 2021 after formation at St. Paul Seminary in St. Paul, MN. Here's a bit about himself in his own words:

I'd like to use this space to help you get to know me, your new associate, a bit. Because it is a small space, I'm going to share something much closer to a trailer than a director's cut. After I was received into the church at the Eater Vigil in 2013, I flew to Madrid to walk the Camino de Santiago. By the time I had tossed my worn-out trail running shoes on a stinky pile of other worn-out shoes in a pilgrim hostel by the Atlantic Ocean I had walked across the width of Spain.

The pilgrimage was a wonderful experience, full of breathtaking scenery, tasty food and new friends. But when I was finished with the pilgrimage, looking west across the ocean at Fisterra (Land's End), I had no idea that the pilgrimage was not finished with me. It yielded up its greatest gifts to me retrospectively over the following months and years. And I want to share just a couple of those gifts with you today.

One was the powerful experience of making my way across a country the size of Spain one human step at a time. I look back, astonished that I attempted the journey and even more astonished that I completed it successfully all without the use of even a bicycle. What I can do seems so modest; everything I am capable of is proportioned to the Fr. Mike-sized pace of about three and a half feet. And that normal human pace, done consistently and mostly in the same direction carried me across Spain in a month. When I look at the tasks set before—and there are so many daunting tasks—I remember my experience of the Camino and how my modest abilities exercised consistently were enough to finish an extraordinary journey.

Another gift was the experience of the path. My instinct and my training is to want to know everything and to have everything planned out prior to any undertaking. But that was not



my experience of the Camino. On the path, you can perhaps see to the next crest or to the next curve and no farther. There are signs—a scallop shell or yellow arrow painted on a rock or set into the cobbles of the street to guide the pilgrim. And that is enough to set a direction and take the next steps. Even from the tops of mountains (and there are a few of those on the path), you can only see so far. I now understand this as a metaphor for life—I have never met anyone to whom God showed their whole path. But God always shows us at least the next few steps. Until we take those steps, we can't see what's next, what's over the hill or around the curve. But when we take those steps, then we see what's next, we see the next segment of the path.


The Camino has become for me a beautiful lived metaphor of how we are meant to walk with God and how he leads us bit by bit on the extraordinary journey of life. I hope this little introduction gives you a sense of who I am. I look forward over the coming months and years to growing to know you better as well. When we meet, please share a little bit of who you are as well! May God bless you.

Summer Lecture Series: Mass Isn't Boring

We've all been bored at Mass. It's tragic, but it has unfortunately been the reality for many faithful Catholics over the years. Too often, we become passive spectators; we sit, stand and kneel on cue, we hope the homily will end soon, we hope the music fits our personal preferences and we hope that Mass ends in under an hour, assuming we stay to the end at all.

Join Fr. Ryan Glaser for a series of lectures on the spirituality and theology of the Church's liturgy. The goal of these lectures is to come to a deeper understanding and appreciation of the Church's worship as well as to aid in a fuller, "actual" participation in the liturgy as called for by the Second Vatican Council and recent Popes. Fr. Rvan will present for about 45 minutes so as to leave time for discussion and Q&A at the end. Each lecture is "self-contained" so no worries if you cannot make it to all of them, come to as many or as few as you would like. The lectures will each be offered once at 10 a.m. and the other at 7 p.m. on the following Wednesdays.

New Auditioned Children's Choirs

Children's choirs have long been integral to the Catholic Church's mission. One of the most celebrated, Les Petits Chanteurs la Croix de Bois (The Little Singers of the Wooden Cross), was brought to prominence in 1917 by Msgr. Fernand Maillet in France. This program grew with choirs throughout Europe which in 1947 had the first International Congress in Paris. During which Msgr. Maillet gave the federation its name, PUERI CANTORES.



THE AMERICAN FEDERATION

The American Federation Pueri Cantores was formed in 1953 to accomplish the same mission in the United States. Choirs proliferated in Catholic churches and schools across the country and took a significant and inspirational leadership role in worship and education-related events.

The Holy Name of Jesus is now part of this Federation and will continue to spread the education of the values of Catholic faith through music and liturgical understanding. We will also employ the "Voice for Life" music curriculum of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM).

Because of the affiliations with PUER CANTORES and RSCM, Dr. Richard Owen with direct two new groups of choirs for children. Both are auditioned choirs; one for girls and one for boys grades 4 through 6.




