An Evil Generation?

Jesus says to the crowd, "This generation is an evil generation; it seeks a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of Jonah." (Luke 11:29; Matthew 12:39) They seek a sign, but do not see any of the miracles Jesus is performing as signs; just prior to this, Jesus casts out a demon from a possessed man and is accused of acting in the name of Beelzebub. So many people are blind to who Jesus is and in whose name He is acting.

Jesus calls this generation wicked, but there is no evidence that they are unusually wicked. There were generations of the chosen people where most turned from the God who chose them to worship Baals. This is not one of those generations. To the contrary, one of the recurring themes in the Gospels is the conflict between Jesus and the scribes and the Pharisees. Jesus did not accuse the scribes and the Pharisees of idol-worshipping or laxity, but of a hypocritical rigorism that misses the point. And so I think it is helpful for us to think of the evil of that generation in that context.

The evil that the scribes and Pharisees had fallen into was a **subtle** evil. They were proud to be Jews. They were proud that they had the 613 laws to follow, laws of worship, of sacrifice and of ritual purity. They were, or so they thought, far from the drama of the pillar of cloud during the day and the pillar of fire at night, far from God sending down fire to burn up the very stones of the altar, far from the sun standing still in the sky or from the possibility of entertaining three visiting angels. They had the mindset that God had acted in history and indeed was still their God, but had given them their religion and was no longer acting. They had the mindset that it was up to them, that God was not present in their lives. The scribes and the Pharisees had their religion, their many rules, but did not have the lived experience of God in their lives.

This was their mistake, their lie, for God's movement through history, and through their lives, always has a pedagogical component. God was teaching them, through His miracles, but also through the laws He gave His people, to be attentive to His active presence in their lives. They lost touch with this central truth, and so did not see their religious practices as something which led them closer to God, but merely as practices that they needed to follow. Thus Jesus was able to name them truly as an evil generation.

The question I have for us is: in what ways are we like that evil generation? Do we allow the experience of our Catholic faith lead us into deeper relationship with our living God, who is Emmanual, who is always present in our lives? Or are we in danger of reducing our faith to merely a set of rules and practices, and in so doing blinding ourselves to the signs of the times, to His active presence in our lives? *(Continued on page two)*

My invitation is to be attentive to these movements, to cultivate a relationship with the living God, to walk with eyes of expectant faith, so that when we stand before His judgment seat, He will call us, not an evil generation, but sons and daughters.
