## Parish Survey: You spoke, we listened – and the dialog continues

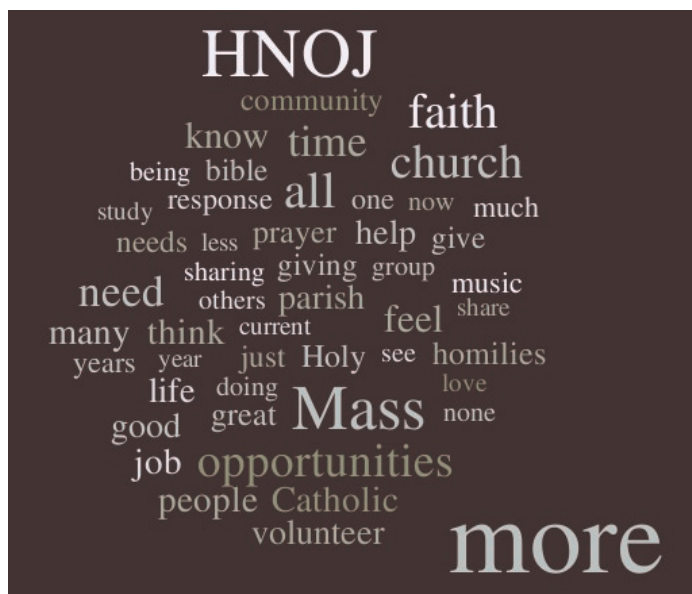
In this online age, it has become increasingly common to see “word clouds” - images composed of words, in which the size of each word indicates its frequency or importance. Word clouds are a way to instantly and visually convey the essence of a particular piece of writing and, these days, anyone with a little technical savvy can cut and paste blocks of copy into one of the many online apps to create one.

The word cloud accompanying this article illustrates the 50 words most often mentioned in the recent Holy Name of Jesus (HNOJ) Catholic Community parish survey. The group of parish volunteers who worked on designing, conducting and analyzing the survey cut and pasted all of the responses into a word cloud generator, and this was the result.

Not surprisingly, some of the

largest, most prominent words are Mass, faith, church, need, Catholic and, of course, HNOJ. But it is interesting to note that the largest, most prominent word is “more”

A closer examination of the survey results makes it easy to understand why. The 531 parishioners who responded to the survey said that they want and need “more” in a many areas: more prayer, more knowledge about Catholicism and the Bible, more ways to serve and be served, more community, more tools to grow and share their faith,



and many other desires reflecting their personal needs and beliefs.

Interestingly, another conspicuous word in the cloud is “opportunities.” As parish leadership reflects on the survey

results, and the desire for “more” that was expressed by so many of us, there is clearly a personal and spiritual hunger that begs to be satisfied.

The good news is that there are countless “opportunities” that you can already take advantage of to feed that hunger. Many of those opportunities are already in place in the form of the many thriving ministries offered here at HNOJ. But the survey sparked many other ideas. Parish leadership has spent the past few months thoughtfully considering what you told us, we are already acting on many of those ideas, and we plan to “continue the dialog” with follow-up research.

Under the guidance of Father Steve and the parish leadership, we organized the survey around the four main themes of the book “The Four Signs of a Dynamic Catholic” by the noted Catholic author and speaker Matthew Kelly. Those four themes are prayer, study, generosity and evangelization. We ended up with 19 questions, and the surveys were completed online or on paper.

As one of the volunteers who worked on the project, let me give all of you who responded to the survey a heartfelt “Thank you!” I will spare you the geeky research jargon like “statistical significance” and “margin of error.” But suffice it to say that the response was excellent. You are serious about your faith and your parish, and it shows. We also plan to conduct follow-up research to flesh out our understanding of some demo-

graphic groups that were a bit underrepresented in the results. But please let me emphasize that the level of response from the parish as a whole was more than enough to have confidence in the validity and usefulness of the results. The survey is a treasure trove of information that will help the HNOJ priests, deacons, staff and volunteers to better serve your spiritual needs for years to come.

Overall, the feedback was very good. Most of you are quite satisfied with HNOJ. The parish is particularly strong when it comes to “the Sunday experience,” with more than three-quarters of you saying that the need that HNOJ is meeting best is “delivering a welcoming, engaging Mass experience.” Most of the rest of the results were similarly positive - but not all. Leadership is taking all of the comments very seriously and using them to make HNOJ an even stronger parish.

After getting a good understanding of the results, the next challenge for us was how to best share the results with you. As I mentioned, there is a massive amount of valuable data. Yet we know how busy you are - in fact, you told us so in the survey! So we don’t want to overwhelm you with a huge pile of data you might not have time to read.

Therefore, we decided to share the survey results in bite-sized morsels that will be a little easier to digest. During the next few weeks, you will be receiving a series of four postcards, each briefly exploring one of the four major themes of the survey:

- ◆ Talking with God (Prayer)
- ◆ Learning About Your Faith (Study)
- ◆ Sharing Your Gifts (Generosity)
- ◆ Sharing Your Faith (Evangelization)

So please watch your mailbox for the postcards during the next few weeks. Meanwhile, we will continue to listen. Although we are very pleased with the level of response to the survey, it was just the first step. As noted earlier, we plan to continue the dialog to gain a deeper understanding of how HNOJ Parish can better satisfy your spiritual needs. We look forward to sharing more about that in the weeks and months to come.

## What is a Deacon?

This is the question I asked Deacon Sam Catapano. Before working for Holy Name of Jesus, I did not have a full understanding of the vocation and what it entails. So I posed my



curiosity to Deacon Sam, and started a delightful conversation about his journey.

Seated in the gathering space, where Deacon Sam is often greeting everyone, we discussed what it means to be a Deacon and how Sam came to be one. Sam's response to my question was without hesitation and better than a Wikipedia definition: "A male who has dedicated his life to serving God as a teacher, preacher or administrator in the Church. Can be married or unmarried, but must be married before ordination. A Deacon is considered an ordained minister for life, subject to obedience to the bishop. Deacons can perform the Sacraments of Marriage and Baptism, and can distribute Communion but they cannot forgive sins."

According to Sam, when he became a Deacon 11 years ago, the study was three years long. If the student is married, as Sam was, the wife is expected to attend classes as well. Currently, the formal formation program is five years long, and men between the ages of 25 and 59 may apply.

Deacon Sam had a "desire to serve God in a special way, but did not know what that was." He pursued that calling at Saint Paul Seminary. Since then Sam served for ten years as the School Chaplain, assisted in the spirituality of the

parishioners, visited the sick and dying, administered Sacraments, conducted Baptism classes and presided over weddings and funerals.

Many Deacons have a professional and family life before becoming a Deacon, and they bring those life skills to God's work. Sam had a beloved wife, Ann, whom he met as a senior in high school. Ann lived in the neighborhood but attended a different high school, and she was the "prettiest girl in the neighborhood." They both attended St. Peter Canisius College in New York where Sam majored in accounting and Ann majored in English. Sam then served three years in the Army Infantry, his college degree allowed him to start as an officer, 2nd Lieutenant. The Army took Sam and Ann from Buffalo, NY to Fort Brague, NC to Fort Benning, GA and finally Fort Jackson, SC. After his volunteer military service ended, Sam went to work for General Mills in Buffalo, NY and was later transferred to Chicago, and then landed in Minneapolis. Sam had a long 42 year career at General Mills before retiring. During those years, Ann and Sam raised a family of five girls and one son.



Deacon Sam is a light to all of us; we are blessed that he found his calling to become Deacon. Soon afterward, El Salvador descended into a decade-long civil war that claimed the lives of upward of 60,000 El Salvadorians.

Archbishop Romero will be Beatified (the second step toward canonization as a saint) this month on May 23. More

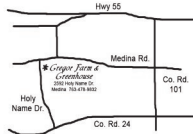

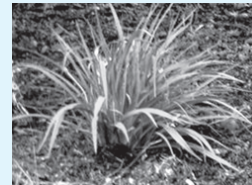
