### FISCAL YEAR 2020 NOTES AND HIGHLIGHTS

Thank you to you, our parishioners, for helping HNOJ navigate through a challenging year! You have affirmed that "nothing can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ." (Romans 8:39) When we entered the COVID shut down, we didn't know how it would impact parish finances. You rose to the challenge, however, giving generously, even in the face of uncertainty. We are deeply grateful!

#### **PARISH**

#### Offertory Revenue:

Overall Offertory income was \$117,000 ahead of last year. Much of this can be attributed to Special Gifts of \$196,000 over and above regular Sunday giving. Envelope giving was below budget, but was offset by an increase in electronic giving. Plate collections ended the year nearly \$11,000 below budget due to shut-down and attendance limits. This trend will continue into the new fiscal year with plate expected to be down nearly \$60,000 from normal Mass attendance levels.

### Paycheck Protection Program:

HNOJ was fortunate to receive loan proceeds of \$720,000 under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP"). The PPP, established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"), provides for loans of amounts up to 2.5 times the average monthly payroll expenses. The loan and interest are forgivable after 24 weeks as long as HNOJ uses the funds for eligible purposes, including payroll and benefits. We have met these requirements and will be applying for loan forgiveness. The loan is a liability until it is forgiven, so it does not appear as income in our statement.

#### Salaries/Benefits:

We ended the year \$115,000 under budget. This is largely due to vacancies in the Administration and Maintenance departments and delaying the hire of a part-time Faith Formation staff position.

#### • Liturgy & Music:

Liturgy, music and Sunday hospitality expenses were down due to the shut-down and Mass limitations. COVID brought the unexpected filming expense of Mass. The mixing of sound and posting the video to our website runs about \$500 per weekend. A worthwhile investment to keep us spiritually connected!

## • Buildings & Grounds:

Overall maintenance expenses were down while the building was closed. Janitorial supplies were nearly \$6,000 over budget due to purchase of large quantities of supplies and equipment to disinfect. This will remain a significant expense in the year ahead. We received an \$8,000 COVID discount on our property insurance premium.

#### **SCHOOL**

#### • Tuition & Fees:

Overall, tuition was ahead of budget with a few more students in PreK and K-6 than budgeted.

#### • Fundraising:

The school IgNight Gala raised \$111,000, some of which was dedicated to technology improvements. Other fundraisers included Rake-athon, Turtle Trot, and a new Golf Tournament which raised about \$10,000.

#### School Donations:

In addition to ongoing donations, we received \$20,000 from CSCOE for marketing and a generous memorial gift of \$25,000.

### School Operating Expenses:

Includes supplies, paper, postage, computers, marketing, lunch program, child care, maintenance and other operating expenses. Computer and marketing expenses totaling nearly \$100,000 account for the increase over last year and were covered by fundraising and grants.

### **Year End Surplus**

With the generosity of contributions and a reduction in expenses due to both the shut down and not filling several staff positions, we ended this fiscal year with a very healthy surplus. This will allow us to boldly face the uncertainties of this fall and winter and to live as disciples. During this time, we are also continuing to plan for the future of the parish through facility space studies and cost estimations.




